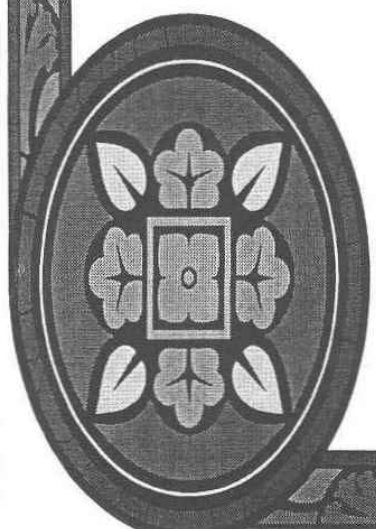
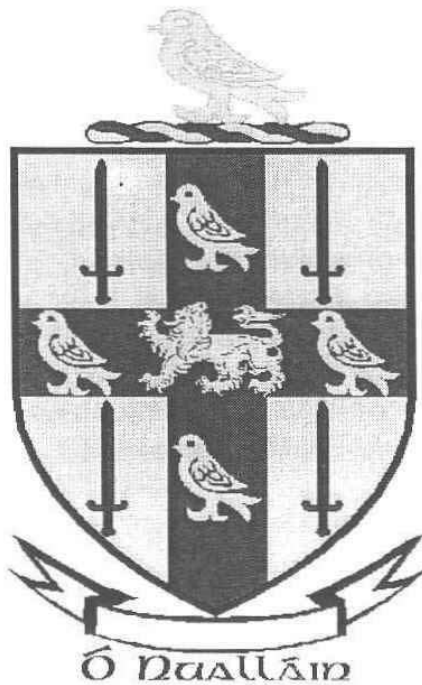

## ***Early Irish Farming***

A brief glimpse into the way of life of our ancestors, taken from the book, "Early Irish Farming" by Fergus Kelly.

There are no contemporary maps or plans of seventh or eighth century Irish farms, so our knowledge of their layout must be pieced together from the written word and from archaeological excavation. Both types of evidence indicate a pattern of scattered farmsteads in the more fertile parts of the country with considerable uncultivated areas of mountain, woodland and marsh. The law-texts regularly represent the typical land holding as being a rectangular block surrounded by four neighbouring farms. This is obviously a simplification, but it at least demonstrates how contemporary observers perceived the general pattern of land-settlement.

There seem to have been few concentrations of population. There is documentary evidence, which indicates the presence of ports, which would naturally have attracted a population dependent on trading, boat building and fishing. However, it is significant that the political centre of each Tuath or Kingdom at this time was the Oenach, an assembly of freemen which took place annually at a fixed site, often a low hill.

Trading seems also to have been carried out on such occasions, as well as horse racing, music and story telling. These assemblies thus fulfilled many of the functions associated with towns in other societies i.e. government, political discussion, trade, social intercourse and entertainment.

It is probable that the largest concentrations of population were to be found in and around the major monasteries. Great areas of land were owned by the church, and managed by the abbots in the same way as secular landowners, with monastic clients and tenants providing the food, rent and labour. The population at the monastic settlement of Armagh was large enough to be described as a town. The growth of population associated with the monasteries is also reflected in the development of the Irish word cathair. Originally it referred to a fortified residence of a King or Lord, but already in the law-texts, it is used of any built up place. In some instances it is used specifically of a monastic settlement. Evidence of the monasteries as commercial centres is to be found from the tenth century onwards.

## ***Tracing your Ancestors in Ireland***

The first and most important task is to seek out information from your own immediate family. Encourage older relations to recount their stories and tales. Gather all written material such as letters, wills, diaries, photographs, certificates and other family documents. Family burial plots should also be visited, as gravestone inscriptions can sometimes yield valuable information.

If however you have no older relatives to consult about your family history, or if the family archives do not contain vital clues regarding your Irish born ancestor, do not be disheartened. It should be possible for you to access records within your own country and thus gain the necessary clues to help you further your research. Civil marriage certificates often contain the names of at least one parent. Gravestone inscriptions and obituary notices can record valuable information such as precise place of origin in Ireland and names of parents. Other clues may be extracted from documents such as naturalisation papers, census returns etc.

## ***Genealogical Research in Ireland***

Once you have taken your search from your homeland to Ireland, you must decide how you will complete the research in Ireland. Many people all over the world enjoy conducting their own research and are happy to spend their vacation doing so but successful research may take a number of years.

If you do not wish to conduct your own research or spend your entire vacation on research you can avail of professional research services. Professional genealogical researchers can carry out all or part of your research before you travel to Ireland, allowing you to plan your itinerary in advance. You will be able to see all the attractions that Ireland has to offer with visits to places associated with your family.

## ***Irish Genealogy Limited***

Irish Genealogy Ltd. (IGL) is the umbrella organisation for genealogical research services in Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland.

The Board of IGL is comprised of representatives from various national institutions and bodies such as the Irish Family History Foundation (IFHF), the association of Professional Genealogists in Ireland (APGI), the association of Ulster Genealogists and Record Agents (AUGRA).

APGI and AUGRA members carry out research in the various national archives and record repositories. IFHF members are local research centres who use their own computer databases to carry out research for a specific area, usually a county. IGL can advise you on the research services that are available and refer you to an appropriate service provider. The research services will advise you on the possibilities for research and the facts involved. You should provide as much information as possible when contacting IGL.

## ***Conducting your own research***

If you enjoy doing your own family research and the chase is as important as getting results, you will enjoy your stay in Ireland if you plan well. Use the archives in your own country to get as much information as possible before you leave for Ireland. Use the Internet to gather information on Ireland and its archives.

## ***Irish genealogical sources***

In general, Irish genealogical sources fall into four main categories as follows.

- Civil records of Birth, Marriage and Death.
- Church records of Birth and Marriage.
- Land/Property valuation records.
- Census returns.

These are the most commonly used sources. They are also more likely to yield more positive results than limited sources such as land deeds, wills, letters of administration etc. The majority of them can be consulted in Dublin repositories.

## ***The National Library of Ireland***

The National Library of Ireland is situated on Kildare Street – just east of Dublin's main shopping street, Grafton Street. At the Library, the new Genealogical Advisory Service is the perfect place to commence your Irish research. In conjunction with the Association of Professional Genealogists in Ireland, the National Library provides this service - free of charge - to personal callers. Visitors to the service are provided with an overview of Irish genealogical records, offered expert advice on their specific family research and given access to reference material and finding aids. They may then proceed to one of the other Dublin repositories, or remain in the National Library where they can gain access to micro-form copies of such records as Griffith's Primary Valuation of Tenements, the Tithe Applotment Books and most Roman Catholic parish registers up to the year 1880. The Library also has a large collection of landed estate records, newspapers and other useful sources.

## ***General Register Office***

The GRO holds the civil records of marriage, other than Roman Catholic, from 1845 and birth, death and Roman Catholic marriage from 1864 for all Ireland to 1921, as well as civil records of birth, marriage and death from 1922 for the Republic of Ireland. Civil records of birth, death and marriage from 1922 for Northern Ireland are held at the GRO in Belfast.

## ***The National Archives***

The National Archives of Ireland is situated within a fifteen-minute walk of the National Library. Among the many collections in the National Archives, which will be of interest to genealogists, the following are the most obvious.

- Griffith's Primary Valuation of Tenements.
- Tithe Applotment Books.
- 1901 and 1911 Census Returns.
- Remnants of some Census Returns for the years 1821, 1831, 1841, and 1851.
- Transportation Records - Ireland to Australia from 1788-1868
- Will calendars, Wills and Letters of Administration
- Microfilm copies and transcripts of some Church of Ireland Registers

## ***Bishop Edward Nolan***

Was born in 1793 in Tullow, where his father James Nolan "occupied a position of respectability" according to Fr. Comerford in his collections relating to the Diocese of Kildare and Leighlin.

Sir Bernard Burke the eminent genealogist stated that James Nolan was descended in a direct line from Cahir O'Nolan of Ballykealy, who died in 1592. James Nolan, the Bishop's father was himself born in 1758 and was married to Mary Moore of Tullow in 1789.

A very peculiar tale is related about Mary Moore. When she was just a girl, Dr. Keefe, the then Bishop, gave her an Episcopal ring, telling her to keep it for one of her sons who should be a Bishop. Mary kept the ring, not mentioning the matter, except to her husband, and upon Dr. Keefe's demise, gave it to Dr. Delaney, informing him of the circumstances under which it came into her possession. Dr. Delaney accepted it, but only in trust, and returned it before his death in 1814. The ring is still in the possession of a member of the family. (Comerford, Collections. Vol. 1, Page 122).

Edward became a pupil at Carlow College as did his brothers John, Thomas, Patrick and Daniel. Edward wished to become a priest and was sent to Maynooth. While he was there he had second thoughts and he was sent home, where he remained for two years. He returned to Maynooth in 1814, and was ordained in 1819, by Dr. Doyle who was then the Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, known as J.K.L. He was held in the highest esteem in the college and after attaining his doctorate in Philosophy he was offered a permanent post in the college which he declined. He went back to Carlow, where he was appointed a Professor in Carlow College occupying the chairs of Logic and later Theology. He was reputed to be a man of great gentleness and amiability. He led a Saintly life of regularity, edification and devotedness to his duties. He was held in such esteem by the Bishop, J.K.L. that he appointed him as his confessor.

One of his greatest moments was when he took part in the celebrated Bible Society debate in Carlow town. This was a huge event and admission was by ticket only. It was a defining moment in the history of Catholicism as the very essence of religion was being challenged in public debate. The Protestant side was represented by very able men Hon and Rev. E. Wingfield, Rev. Mr. Daly and Rev. Mr. Pope (no relation to the Pontiff). The Catholic side was upheld by Rev. McSwiney, Rev. Clowry and Dr. Nolan. .

The brunt of the entire argument from the Catholic viewpoint was maintained by Dr. Nolan, who gave an absolutely brilliant delivery that was most logical and lucid and refuted entirely the views put forward by the Protestant side.

During the course of his speech he delivered a withering condemnation of the Tithe System and upheld the right of the Catholic clergy to place their weight behind the most suitable candidates in elections.

After the death of Dr. Doyle (JKL), he was appointed as Bishop of the Diocese in 1834, but he was not destined to live a long life. After just a few short years Dr. Nolan caught typhus fever and died in October 1837. He was only 43 years old.

He had a huge funeral which was attended by people of all persuasions and he was buried next to Dr. Doyle in the Cathedral.

## ***The Irish Abroad***

One of the most startling statistics about Ireland is that half of all the people born here since 1820 have emigrated. It is estimated that there are more than sixty million people worldwide who are of Irish origin, Indeed there can be very few countries in which the Irish have not settled at some time in the past. The classic picture of Irish emigration is of starving peasants fleeing from a country racked by the potato famine in the late 1840's. While this is not a false image -over one million people did leave Ireland during those terrible years - it is merely part of the story. Emigration has been a feature of Irish life since the earliest period of our history. I will discuss emigration to the Americas, Europe, Australia and New Zealand in future newsletters.
